








- Need for localization of the SDG target which did not occur with the MDG







































Localization - SDG's Global Examples

German Cities

- German Municipal Declaration 13 initiatives through which municipalities can make contributions to Localiazation
 - Information Sharing, Networking, Lobbying, Advocacy, Translation of Global Goals Locally
 - The City of Hanonver developed its 2030 strategy on the global goals

Netherlands Cities

- VNG International promoting international co-operation have developed a Menu of Inspiration which identified ideas for localization
- Road show with Schools, Mayors and municipalities on the 2030 goals

Seoul City

- Developed a Sustainable City Vision
- Brazilian Confederation of Municipalities
 - Developed a tool to support the monitoring of the implementation of the SDG's



Localization - SDG

Ethekwini Examples

- SDG Goals incorporated into the Municipalities IDP as part of the strategic approach to sustainability
- Alignment of all SDBIP projects to the SDG goals and Targets
- Reviewing MILE masterclasses to focus on the SDG's localization
- SDG advocacy through the various Local Government networks
- Assist in training of SDG Trainers (11 Ethekwini Municipal staff trained)
- City's Localization process is the only one to feature in the Voluntary National Report to the United Nations in 2019
- IDP Manager one of the co-authors of the SDG Localization Manual developed by the UCLG and the UNDP (Four Modules released to date)



SDG - Alignment

- Ethekwini Alignment of the SDG to the IDP
 - Bottom Up Approach using capital projects as the foundation
 - Each Capital Project was aligned to a SDG and SDG target
 - Best Match principle was used with a 1 to 1 relationship
 - Source document Municipal SDBIP and for 2018/19 Capital Projects List
 - 2017/18 analysis included Capital
 - 2018/19 and 2019/20 MTEF analysis using MSCOA mapping
 - Impact of MSCOA on the analysis results, improve long term benchmarking of data



Factors Supporting Improved Localization

- Institutional Reform supporting the implementation of the SDG's
- Project alignment supports the financing of SDG's and awareness
- Beginning to create a benchmark for monitoring
- Capacity building is key and critical in implementation
- Cities need to promote policy coherence, and collaborative approaches between all spheres of government
- Co-ordination of Public Sector Expenditure and the need to improve own revenue generation
- SDG Localization must contribute to the construction of social capital



Way Forward

- Strengthen awareness of SDG and the NUA to ensure ownership
- Support VNR and SDG reporting
- Promote active participation in SDG localization
- Promote the development of monitoring tools for SDG implementation
- Advocate for credible localized city level datasets aligned with the SDG's
- Create Spaces for SDG dialogue
- Promote the implementation of the NUA as an accelerator for the SDG implementation
- Advocate for localized solutions in the quadrennial Global Sustainable Development Report in 2019
